
Dear Parents/Guardians:

# 2009-2010 School Year Information

Cell Phones—Please be advised that students may not use cell phones anytime during the school day. (See student handbook page 14.) If any student becomes ill during the school day, they must report to a school nurse. The nurse will notify the parents.

Locker Search—Please be aware that student lockers in Washington Township High School are the property of the school district and are subject to random searches as conducted as part of our efforts to ensure the safety and well being of our students, as well as to ensure a drug-free and weapon-free school environment.

Student Planner/Handbook—On opening day, all students received a copy of the 2009-10 Student Planner/Handbook. We kindly request that parents review the handbook together with their child to familiarize themselves with important information about our high school, its programs, services, and policies.

## School Nurse Reminders

If your child requires medication, either prescription or over the counter, during the school day the following procedure must be followed: 1. A letter of authorization must be submitted by the parent/guardian and physician to be filed in the Nurse's Office. The physician's information must include name of medication, dose to be given, time interval of administration, and reason for medication administration. 2. Medication should be brought to the school in the original container and appropriately labeled by the pharmacy or physician and given to the school nurse to ensure proper use. Students may not carry medication while at school unless authorized by the physician and parent/guardian and approved by the school officials. 3. When purchasing medication from retail store or pharmacy, be sure to check expiration date. Request a medication with an expiration date that will make medication available throughout the school year. 4. All medications held by the nurse for school year 2009-2010 need to be picked up by the last student day. Any medications not picked up will be discarded by the nurse. Any "controlled" medications **MUST** be picked up by the parent/guardian. The medication form is available online at the district web site under the "For Parents" section.

If your child becomes ill in school and needs to go home, a parent or a parent designee will be contacted by the Nurse's Office. In order to expedite this, it is imperative that the Nurse's Office has an emergency card on file for each student. Please check with your child to be sure that the card has been completed, signed by a parent/guardian, and submitted to the Nurse's Office.

## **POWER SCHOOL PAPERLESS GRADING PROCEDURES**

In a continued attempt to utilize our available technology, as well as to conserve our use of paper, the high school will no longer print a paper copy of student report cards. As you know, parents/guardians may follow your son/daughter's academic progress on a regular basis through the Parent Log-in to Power School. We encourage you to continue to follow your child's progress, as well as to communicate with your child's teachers. If any parent would like a paper report of your child's grades, please call our Guidance Office #7420, and a report will be mailed to you.

### **Mid-Term and Final Exams**

In an attempt to increase our academic rigor, as well as to prepare your sons/daughters for post secondary education, WTHS will administer mid-term exams during a four day exam schedule during the last week of the first semester. Two exam periods per day of 120 minutes each will be scheduled on February 1, 2, 3, 4, 2010. The days will be early dismissal to allow students to adequately prepare for these exams. Final exams will be administered during the last week of school in a similar fashion.

Both **mid-term and final exams** will be stand alone grades and will be recorded as such in all teachers' gradebooks. Each of our 4 marking periods will be counted as 20%, and each of the exams will be counted as 10% of the year end final grade. The chart below is an example of how a typical Y1 final grade would be calculated.

## In Our Classrooms

### **WTHS Awarded \$500,000 Teaching American History Grant**

As recipients of the Teaching American History Grant sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education, the Washington Township Middle and High School Social Studies and English Departments will benefit from a variety of rich professional development experiences, professional library, online instructional resources, and summer field trips. Pursuing the theme of "Literacy through History," the professional experiences will encourage cross-curricular articulation and instruction. Dedicated to the memory of Ida B. Wells, daughter of former slaves and the first African-American woman to refuse to give up her seat on a segregated train, long before Rosa Parks, this \$500,000 grant spans three years with the possibility of a two-year extension, totaling \$835,000. Approximately 30 middle and high school teachers will be deepening their understanding of American history content, exploring historic sites, and designing state-of-the-art curricular units. Notable speakers will present fall and spring colloquia—featuring scholars, such as Dr. Yohuru Williams, author and university professor. As an alternative funding source, the TAH grant pays all expenses related to the grant—at no cost to the district.

***We are pleased to have been accepted to participate in the NJDOE World Language High School Pilot. Approximately 50 of our students will be tested 3 times in the next 4 years to help us to evaluate linguistic proficiency levels of our students. The accompanying professional development will assist us in learning various strategies to improve student performance. We are very excited about this opportunity.***

On March 24, Mrs. Carchidi's students took part in a special viewing of the commercially released film *Defiance* starring Daniel Craig. The film highlighted the efforts of the Bielski Brothers, whose partisan group established a resistance movement in the forest of what is now Belorussia after the slaughter of their parents and other relatives by the Nazis. Due to their efforts, they saved the lives of 1,200 Jews and overcame starvation, disease, and other horrific obstacles. After viewing the film, one of the Bielski survivors, who was only 10 years old when she and her family sought refuge in the forest encampment, addressed the students and answered questions. She related the heroic efforts of Tuvia Bielski who sent emissaries to infiltrate the Jewish ghettos, recruited new members to join the group, and rallied all the members as they fended off Nazi patrols and air raids. It is believed that some 75,000 people descended from the survivors of the Bielski partisan group.

The event was funded through a grant provided by the Goodwin Holocaust Museum in Cherry Hill, NJ.

## *Dance Club*



This year, the Dance Club is beginning with over 100 dancers ready to experience a variety of dance opportunities that reach beyond their daily dance class curriculum. For example, we already have 2 different events running after school. Students are currently rehearsing for the Annual Spirit Parade, and our dancers are also taking advantage of additional technique classes offered after school by Ms. Romann and Ms. Jackson. These classes will help to increase their dance skills and help to prepare them for upcoming performances.

Currently, donations being made by members of the Club are being given to the Indigenous Pitch Dance Collective, Inc. This is a collective of Philly-based dance companies whose goal is to perform works of artistic excellence that reflect and highlight the diversity of the city and its native, homegrown dance styles. Through the art of dance, they seek to assist and nurture children who have been affected by natural and/or social-economic disasters. Our donations will specifically go to the collective's New Orleans project, which provides arts opportunities for children in need. The Dance Club hopes to help many other organizations throughout the year.

Beginning in November, students in the Dance Club will begin to participate in auditions for select ensembles. This year, these ensembles will include Contemporary, Lyrical, Jazz, Pointe, Modern, Hip-Hop, Irish Step, and Belly Dancing.

## *New Science Lab*



The Biology Lab classroom, F6, received a complete renovation over the summer. The construction costs totaled approximately \$125,000 and were funded through the 2004 referendum. Students are already benefiting from the upgrades made to this classroom.



## Marching Band to Perform at Cotton Bowl



The Minutemen Marching Band is off to a great start. After one of the most productive band camps in recent memory this past August, the band is off to a great start to their competitive season. In addition to performing at the Varsity Football Games, the band will be competing at Collingswood HS, Cumberland Regional HS, Eastern Regional HS, the Delaware Valley Regional at Upper Darby HS, the Yamaha Cup at Giants Stadium, the NJ State Championships here at WTHS, and the Northern States Championships at Allentown, PA. In addition, the band is also preparing for participation in this year's AT&T Cotton Bowl in Dallas, Texas. The trip will occur over the holiday break and includes a field show competition, parade competition, and a massed band halftime performance during the Cotton Bowl game. In addition, the students will get to take in some of the local sites that Dallas has to offer. Dear Parents of the 2010 Senior Class!

On Wednesday, November 18, The Senior Class Photo (**The Big Picture** with the entire senior class) will be taken during 1<sup>st</sup> period in the 9/10 Gym. This will be followed by a brief Class meeting. Students will be dismissed from homeroom to the Gym by P.A. announcement. Order blanks will be distributed through homeroom earlier in that week. Cost of the photo alone is \$17. Additional items will be extra. **Checks made out to Chappell** with completed order forms will be collected on the day of the photo as the students enter the Gym. All materials will be shipped directly to the student's home address. Therefore, it is imperative that the order forms are filled out clearly and accurately. The purchase of this photo is optional!

On Tuesday, December 1, and Wednesday, December 2, orders will be taken for student Cap and Gowns during all lunch periods in the Senior Cafeteria. The fee is \$25 payable by cash or check. If paying with a check, the **check should be made out to WTHS STUDENT FUND C/G**. All Cap and Gown materials are kept by the student. During your lunch periods on December 1 and December 2 Company reps will be on hand to assist with the ordering and to take orders for Graduation Announcements and other memorabilia. ## *WTHS Orchestra—Concert Tour of Austria*

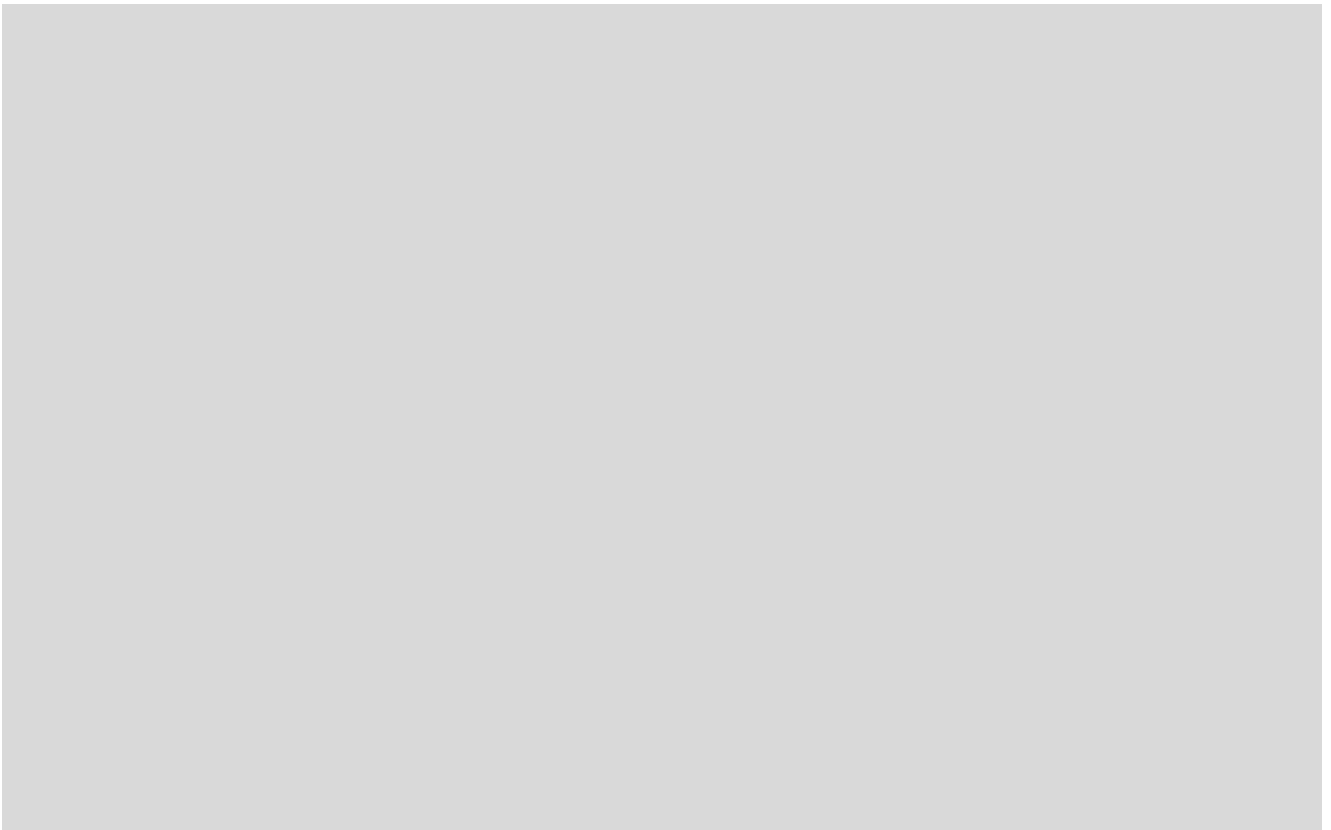

They saw a crowd of students, parents, and teachers wearing red tee shirts that read “WTHS Orchestra: Austria Trip Summer 2009,” lots of string instruments and other musical equipment, piles of luggage, and an over-sized tour bus. What was going on?

Answer: WTHS Orchestra students and parent chaperones, under the direction of WTHS Orchestra Director Judy Barnett and former Cherry Hill East Orchestra Director Bridget Kasinskas, were heading to JFK airport to fly to Vienna for a 10 day concert tour of Austria!

The group returned safe and sound on July 3 with photos, souvenirs, stories to share with their families and friends, and experiences they will remember for the rest of their lives. The tour was incredibly successful and exciting. The orchestra’s first of its four Austrian performances was in front of Vienna’s famous Schonbrunn Palace. The musicians were still jet-lagged and a bit nervous, but the large and enthusiastic crowd made them feel welcome and appreciated. Austrian audiences loved the all-American repertoire: Beach Boys songs, jazz standards, and selections by well-known American composers.

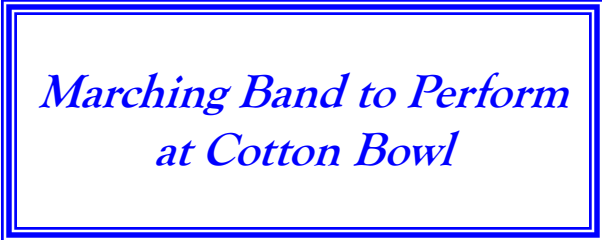
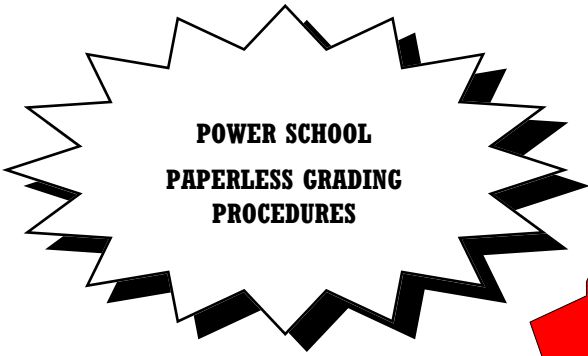
